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Foreword

We are in the midst or an existential crisis, unparalleled to anything the world has ever faced, and it is disproportionally affecting the worst off in our world: we all need to respond.

The deterioration of our climate and planet is distressing but recognising where we are is the first step in making a positive contribution towards tackling the crises. All journeys start with a single step and summoning the courage to climb the mountain in front or us and we all need to take steps in this journey.

Our organisation is no different. We feel the responsibility to use our cultural privilege to raise awareness of the climate emergency and the positive actions that can make a difference. We began climbing our mountain by looking at ourselves, our programme, our suppliers, our ethos, and have plotted a series of steps to play our role and now present them in this inaugural Climate Action Plan (CAP).

Adapting everyday elements from our daily lives does make a difference and contributes to the solution. You might feel taking bigger steps to support global causes is required (and if you do all power to you), or you could just make sure you are doing your recycling correctly; either way your personal contributions are crucial and count. Our CAP is informed by collective research and team work that delved into the resources of the galleryclimatecoalition.org.

By challenging and questioning our behaviours we've devised a series of climate commitments that we feel are required and achievable. Some represent small steps, some larger but we are committed to taking them, being part of the solution and not further telling the problem.

We recognise the platform our galleries, studios and digital spaces create and the powerful messages artists and their work can convey.

Therefore as part of this CAP we have launched our Art for Climate Action (AfCA) programme. AfCA supports artists to talk about the climate issues they feel passionate about and the actions we the public can take. To date artists have presented concerns and actions about rising sea levels and climate refugees, re-wilding to make our city greener, reproductive choice and climate activism. As the programme develops we will continue to support artists to make work they feel is important, pressing, and requires public attention.

We hope our work leads to and increased public awareness of the steps you can take in climbing your own mountain.

We will continue to work with artists to harness the power that art has to make change and encourage radical thinking.

We will continue to commission work which encourages people to connect with environmental issues to bring about meaningful change in both perceptions and behaviours, leading to climate action.





Reduce, reuse and recycle our exhibition materials, reducing waste and measuring the impact of our exhibitions by using environmental impact assessment forms with artist commissions

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We will develop and implement systems to track the carbon emissions of our commissions and create environmental action reports to measure our progress against our commitment to reduce waste.

We will embrace 'slow curating' by programming longer exhibitions and shifting the traditional aesthetic standards of exhibition making. This will allow us to make more ethical and climate-conscious decisions about materials, seeking 'waste' materials, recycled materials and locally sourced materials and finding ways to make any left over materials available to other creative projects and people in the city.

Nationally we will be an active member of the Gallery Climate Coalition to learn from examples of best practise from across the sector and apply these to our future activity.






Regularly check the progress we are making against the commitments in our Climate Action Plan and annually update the plan through feedback and focus groups

Part of our Art for Climate Action Programme, this immersive exhibition submerged the viewer in a fictional near-future climate dystopia created by neoliberal negligence and greed.

Comprised of various materials and media hinting at climate catastrophes, science fiction dystopias, marketing overhype and Islamic Kitsch, the exhibition was a portal into a deeply neoliberal refugee centre from the year 2058, which houses Middle Eastern asylum seekers displaced due to a global failure in dealing with the climate crisis.

Lizzie Jones is part of a group called Puppet Back Up. Through 2023, Puppet Back Up have connected with youthful people over specific issues.

Together, they have been actively, playfully and artfully involved with these issues, grappling with challenging topics about climate breakdown and climate action.

For this exhibition, Puppet Back Up present two new films and documentary photography by young collaborators, alongside new puppets and prints, from and for action.

For the exhibition Art for Climate Action: Community Projects, Part Two Harry Meadows spent 12 months working with community gardeners in green spaces across Southampton. The outcome, Personal Ecologies: The Community Gardener, explores the imagination of an ecosystem.

The video game and sculpture in this exhibition respond to this call through partnership between art and the ecological practice of a community gardener.


Through an interactive game environment, you are invited to explore entanglements of people, plants, animals and machines.

Holding Space explores the role of reproductive refusal in climate activism and how environmental factors affect decisions about bringing children into the world. The exhibition is informed by the artist's ongoing research into childlessness and different ways of conceiving the future in the face of climate emergency.

An animation is exhibited in the Barker-Mill Project Space. Taking breath as a metaphor for the intimate relationship between body and environment, this work touches on the personal and political stakes of reproductive refusal. In response to what the animation's protagonist calls the "violent comforts" of late capitalism, refusal is here reclaimed as a generative and loving act. Digital effects bring hand-painted imagery to life along with new music by Rosie Carr.




Environmental Impact Report
